Glory to Jesus Christ!

A popular song of the mid-1970s began with the words, “Time keeps on slippin’, slippin’, slippin’ into the future.” This fact of reality is the same for each of us, except we don’t know **how much time we have**.

As Orthodox Christians, we believe that however much time we have, it is **a blessing from God** and opportunities to enjoy being with others, growing closer to God, and most importantly, our time to live in a way worthy of Judgment Day.

☞ The Path to Salvation

Jesus teaches that **how we live each day** impacts how we will be recognized and judged by God the Father. That day may be distant and far away, but like an upcoming quiz in school, it will eventually come, so **we need to prepare now!**

The rich man in today’s gospel parable *did* focus on the here and now, but his actions were self-centered. He shared with his friends, but he didn’t share with those in need, not even with the beggar on his doorstep.

Known by Our Fruit

When the rich man died, he came **face to face with the reality** that a life lacking in love of others results in God not recognizing him.

God recognizes us by our actions – both the good and bad (Matthew 7:17-20). If we repent of our failings, **He will forgive us**. If we are humble in our good deeds, **He will reward us**. But if we act like the rich man, we will too will not be welcomed into Paradise by God.

All the Tools Needed

While the message of **today’s gospel lesson is serious**, it is not without hope. Jesus Christ provides a clear path for us for drawing closer to God. He instructs us in the value of following His example. **The saints are outstanding examples** of how we can follow Christ.

While it may be temporarily difficult to gather as community as we’ve come to expect, our Orthodox Faith can still be expressed in **the liturgy of our daily lives** through prayer, acts of charity, compassion, and especially when we receive the Eucharist.

May **the saints inspire us** to help when someone is in need, repent when we offend, forgive when we are wronged, and offer prayers, and **love others as God loves us**.
